

## 250<sup>th</sup> ANNIVERSARY COMMITTEE NEWS

### History “In Three on the Fourth” and Music Too!

Look and listen for historical "sound bites" and "visual aids" on the **fourth** Sunday of each month during our Anniversary Year. On these Sundays, the contents of our display case located in Fellowship Hall will change. The theme for each month will be highlighted that week with a **three minute** history lesson during the morning service.

We'll also highlight periods in our church's history by exploring **music** that could have been used in worship here at FCCV at different times throughout the years. We'll even have some musical history lessons in the bulletin and in future Carillons! Thanks to James, Mary Jo and the Sanctuary Choir for the help they will provide.

In conjunction with the historical moments to be presented once a month to celebrate our 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary, we will be exploring relevant music for that month's theme or time-period. Rev. Ebenezer Kellogg, our first pastor, is the logical choice for the first Sunday, which is January 22. What was the music like when he began his ministry in 1762?

There are no known records of what was sung in our church back then, but we can assume it was similar to that of the other congregations in the colonies. The evidence that does survive is mostly from the vicinity of Boston, but their closer ties to England (via trade by ship) and the early establishment of a college (Harvard) make their situation different from the very rural and agrarian community of Tolland county, Connecticut. There was likely a few years or decades between changes occurring there and here.

You may be surprised to learn that the pilgrims did not sing hymns. They sang the psalms or a few other biblical canticles. Hymns are paraphrases or free poetic creations and the Protestants felt that only the “word of God” was appropriate to public worship. There were no choirs or soloists. The entire congregation sang in unison with no instrumental accompaniment. These strictures, their simple dress and the exclusive use of the vernacular (English) were part of the Reformation and a reaction to the ways of the established Church of England (and Rome).

The first book to be published in North America (Boston, 1640) came to be known as the Bay Psalm Book and was a metrical translation of the 150 psalms. The translations, though, are not the most poetic—of greater concern was their strict adherence to the Hebrew text. The book was widely adopted and went through many editions over the next hundred years but not until the ninth edition of 1698 was any music included. These were thirteen tunes which could serve to fit the handful of metrical patterns used. Only one of these melodies is familiar to us. In fact, we sing it every Sunday as the Doxology. (The tune is called Old 100<sup>th</sup>.) Isn't it remarkable to think we still use a melody that was very likely sung by the first European settlers in the area, over 370 years ago?!

So, we'll have a go at singing a psalm from the Bay Psalm Book to the tune of Old 100<sup>th</sup>, but without the organ. Here we should mention the practice of "lining out" a psalm. Typically a presenter stood in front and led the singing. He was responsible for choosing a tune to fit the meter of the psalm and selecting a starting pitch so the melody fit comfortably in one's range. Often, due to a shortage of psalm books or lack of literacy, he would read a line of the psalm first, before leading the singing of it. He continued reading each line before it was sung for the entire psalm. Most writers of the time, though, deplored the practice, since it ruined the melody and obscured the meaning of many sentences. So, it was done as a last expedient or because some congregations obstinately clung to tradition.

Conditions were, indeed, rough in a rustic settlement with minimal education and no professional musicians in the colonies. The quality of singing degraded to very poor levels. Some congregations were reported as having known only five or so tunes and sang them very slowly and ponderously. In response, Rev. John Tufts of Newbury, Massachusetts, published a music primer (1712) and initiated schools for singing. Often held at night and soon spread to other communities by itinerant pastors, these schools were popular and made quick progress. Significantly, they taught singing in parts: women and children on soprano or alto, men on tenor or bass. They also used pitch pipes to set the pitch and instruments to accompany the singing; practices which crept into church usage.

We know that in 1728, the General Association of Connecticut in Hartford heard a minister argue persuasively for this new method of "regular singing," and that they approved its use in churches. This new style evolved into what is generally referred to as "shape-note" singing. It was soon displaced in New England by more conventional European practices but it followed the outlying frontier churches westward and southward, eventually to be collected in publications like Southern Harmony or Kentucky Harmony.

The Sanctuary Choir will give an example of this "new way" of singing. It's not unlikely that some form of this singing may have been used in Vernon (Rev. Kellogg graduated from Yale in 1757).

With the relaxing of some of the old restrictions came the desire for more poetic translations in lieu of the older, often clumsy, style. Soon paraphrases and original texts (true hymns) by the likes of Isaac Watts (1674-1748) from England were being adopted. He is still well represented, 150 years later, in the Pilgrim Hymnal. An appropriate text of his, set to the tune of St. Anne, is the hymn "Our God, Our Help in Ages Past."

Not long after, native-born Americans were composing their own texts and anthems. One of the best known is William Billings, a tanner in Boston. His first book of psalms, anthems and canons appeared in 1770 and we'd like to present one such anthem as an example of some of the earliest American sacred music to be written. Whether such an anthem would have been sung in our church at that time is questionable. Choirs were still not regular features in church and such pieces may have been intended for use in singing societies, private recreation or benefit performances.

We'll have more details in the bulletin on January 22 and hope you'll join us for some real "golden oldies."




